On June 20, the world celebrates World Refugee Day. World Refugee Day was first celebrated globally on June 20, 2001 to mark the 50th anniversary of the 1951 Refugee Convention relating to the Status of Refugees. Everyone has the right to seek safety no matter who they are or where they are coming from.






Everyone has the right to seek safety and asylum in another country and UN member states have legal obligations to protect refugees and their rights. The UNHCR, the United Nations refugee agency, reported unprecedented numbers of people forced to flee their homes due to persecution, conflict, violence, or human rights violations.




DID YOU KNOW?



Refugees are protected by international law.

The 1951 Refugee Convention is a key legal document and defines a refugee as:

"someone who is unable or unwilling to return to their country of origin owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion." CFUW advocates for the Canadian government to increase the number of refugees & asylum seekers settled into the country and the expansion of resources to ensure a non-discriminatory system.



Canada has landed 1,088,015 refugees since 1980 across the country. Since August 2021, Canada has welcomed over 15,000 vulnerable Afghans - with a goal of settling over 40,000 through the privately sponsored refugee program, Special Immigration Measures Program, and humanitarian program. Since January 2022, over 43,000 Ukrainians have arrived in Canada seeking safety after the Russian invasion through special immigration programs.
